Strategic Initiatives

- Utilize the school-parent partnership to foster the optimal conditions for children to develop good character.
 - 1. Share specific examples with families how we see their children developing their character; distinguish strengths and areas of focus for growth.
 - 2. Establish opportunities to mentor interested families on how to intentionally parent for the development of good character.
- 3. Find ways for parents to share their character successes within the Countryside Community and the local community at large.
- Enable families to see how character is integrated naturally into the classroom experience.
 - 1. Enhance formal and informal opportunities for parents and prospective parents to visit classrooms, witnessing the magic of children exhibiting good character.
 - 2. Inform parents about CDS's focus on character development so they can be confident ambassadors of the school.
 - 3. Create a platform for parents to share successes and challenges in developing good character and help prospective parents see this unique value.
- Expand opportunities in the school and with the local community to make CDS and its mission a known commodity regarding character development.
 - 1. Create a culture of stewardship and citizenship in developmentally appropriate ways for all levels of our educational program from 16 months to 14 years old.
 - 2. Create opportunities for elementary and middle school students to make real contributions in the community.
 - 3. Gather and communicate information from alums and alum parents about the outcome and value of a CDS education.

Strategic Initiatives

- Prioritize resources so parents can better understand their children's academic achievements.
- 1. Commit to a new digital record keeping system that allows parents to have access to their children's work on-demand as age appropriate.
- 2. Connect the names of Montessori materials with the academic knowledge that they help students build.
- 3. Show parents how the Montessori curriculum incorporates and exceeds essential academic content.
- Reconnect with alums to gather information about what they have achieved academically and professionally.
 - 1. Showcase statistically areas of long-term achievement of alumni.
 - 2. Create a plan to display this information to current and prospective parents.
 - 3. Highlight alumni successes through testimonials regarding transition from CDS to high school.
- Demonstrate to parents that CDS offers one continuous academic experience in which each subsequent program maximizes the gains made in the previous program.
 - Interview parents and understand why they value the complete CDS program and communicate this to potential families.
 - 2. Communicate the critical importance of freedom and responsibility in the classroom in achieving academic excellence for each student at every level.
 - 3. Communicate through examples of student work how following a curriculum more organically, so that students can follow personal interests, is critical to creating an authentic love of learning that lasts for life.

Strategic Initiatives

- Involve parents, both formally and informally, in the everyday program so they understand the value each program level offers students.
 - 1. Employ technology that allows parents more regular views into the classroom.
 - 2. Find more opportunities for parents to make meaningful contributions to the classrooms and community.
 - 3. Establish parent involvement in the enrollment process and utilize this relationship to strengthen and accelerate the connection with new families as they get to know CDS.
- Take steps to help all community members feel a sense of pride, engagement, and being valued.
 - 1. Ensure CDS is a place that makes intentional consideration of all members of our community through work with diversity a wide and deep bank of diverse thinkers who bring different cultures and experiences to the community; equity classrooms that meet students where they are and give help and support when and where it is needed, need-based financial aid for families; and inclusion the school is a safe and welcoming place for all of our constituents regardless of culture, gender, race, sexual or religious orientation.
 - 2. Open the CDS campus as appropriate, allowing parents to utilize it for CDS social, club, and family experiences.
 - 3. Encourage parents to be ambassadors of CDS, using social media to highlight the value and outcomes of a CDS education.
- Grow the visibility of CDS and its mission in the community in order to have greater name recognition in the independent school market.
 - 1. Change our blog to focus on character and parenting, revealing Countryside's unique understanding and expertise on the development of good character.
 - 2. Connect Middle School students in real and significant ways to the local community, particularly connecting them with exposure to businesses and professions.
 - 3. Partner with local compatible businesses to find opportunities to offer informational parent sessions.
